The Sacrament of Covenant (Infant) Baptism

As we read through the Word of God, it becomes clear that God's sovereign grace is embraced in the "covenant" framework of Scripture. By grace alone, God has covenanted with His people that He will have them to/for Himself from every nation, tribe, people, and language (Rev. 7). It is a covenant generally that embraces family solidarity (see Act 2:39; Act 16:31; Genesis 17:7). As noted elsewhere, "every person identified in the Bible as having a household present at his or her conversion also had the household baptized."

Because of God's covenant, all history marches forward to the time when God's covenant people will live in the New Jerusalem in a renewed world order enjoying fully their relationship with God: "they will be His people, and God Himself will be their God" (see Rev. 21:3).

Even today, Christ continues as "the Mediator of the new covenant" (Heb. 8), the one Mediator between God and man (1 Tim. 2). Salvation is covenant salvation: regeneration, justification, adoption, sanctification are covenant mercies. Baptism and the Lord's Supper, corresponding to/replacing the old covenant rites of circumcision and Passover, are covenant ordinances. God's law is covenant law, and keeping it is the truest expression of gratitude for covenant grace and loyalty to our covenant God. An understanding of this covenant of grace guides us through, and helps us appreciate, all the wonders of God's redeeming love.

Christians in our theological tradition believe that children of believers, infant children, are and should be included as members of the visible covenant community, the church. Why? Because we believe, based upon the Bible, that infant children of believers have the status of covenant children and therefore should be baptized, just as Jewish male infants previously had been circumcised. Again, why? Because, if infants are deemed members of the visible covenant community with their believing parents, it is fitting to give them the sign of covenant status and of their place in the covenant community.

Is there something magic about the water? No. Do baptized infants have no obligation to make a public profession of personal faith in Jesus Christ? Certainly, they do. When we celebrate the sacrament of covenant baptism, we publicly recognize a covenant child through the covenant sign of baptism as a child of at least one believing parent (1 Cor. 7:14), thus as a member of the visible church. At the same time, we are careful also to affirm that neither baptism nor being the child of believing parents will suffice to make that child a true believer. At some point, each baptized infant/child must personally turn from their sins and express their own faith in the Lord Jesus Christ.

The outward and visible sign in baptism is water. As water is poured down on the head of a child, we are reminded of the cleansing blood of the Lord Jesus Christ that delivers us from the penalty of $\sin (1 \text{ John } 1:7)$ as well as the sanctifying virtue of the Holy Spirit delivering us from the power of $\sin (Romans 8:2)$.

SERMON NOTES

SERMON QUESTIONS

- Rebekah and Isaac were infertile for 20 years of their marriage.
 They prayed and sought the LORD. He answered Isaac's prayer and then gave Rebekah insight into how her twins would interact with one another. Do you remember what God told her?
- Those twins struggled together in utero (25:22), at birth (25:24-26), and when they had grown up (25:27). Furthermore, this conflict continued in the respective nations formed from them long after they were dead (Num.20:14-21)! What do we make of this? How does seed theology help us make sense of this conflict? Have you ever wondered why Christians are persecuted, hated and suffer at the hands of unbelievers?
- We make the mistake if we only think unbelievers harm believers.
 Our passage also reminds us that believers can easily mistreat or sin against other believers. Where do we see this in this text?
- On some level, this passage is ultimately about the birthright. How
 do we see this grammatically? Why was it so important then?
- How does Esau treat the birthright (see also Hebrews 12:15-16)?
 Why might Isaac want Esau to have it, against God's decree in 25:23? While Jacob is never scolded in scripture for his cunning ways, why is he no better than Esau?
- On some level, no one in this passage is worthy of God's beautiful birthright. Truth be told, we are in some ways like the people in this passage. When have you been like Esau? Isaac? Jacob?
- This passage is a reminder that the blessing of the firstborn can be given to those who are not, by definition, true firstborns! God's true firstborn son is Jesus. He is a greater Jacob. Contrast Jesus with Esau and Jacob. How is Jesus better?
- Jesus is the one who brings the blessings of God's promise to Abraham to us. In Christ, we have a people, a place, protection, and God's presence with us! Meditate on this. How does receiving this "birthright" transform us into a people that blesses other people, cherishes and pursues friendship with God's family, renounces underhanded and deceitful ways, experience hope in the face of death, trust God's vengeance at the final judgement, marvel at God's radical forgiveness for all of our sins now, and joyfully awaits our eternal home?

Jesus is Building His Church in a Dechurching World: Fellowship Hall

In The Great Dechurching, Jim Davis explores the greatest religious movement in American history—40M have left the church in the last 25 years. Now, perhaps more than ever, we need a robust, biblical picture of what the Church is and why it matters. The Bible defines the Church as a building, a body, and a bride. Jesus died for the Church and the Bible is written to the Church. Understanding the Church properly is central both to understanding the Bible and to living the Christian life.

In this class, we will explore a robust definition of the Church, the story of the Church, the mission of the Church, what makes a healthy church, and the multiethnic church. We will also explore the relationship of the Church and the world, especially in light of our current cultural moment.

Together, we will consider important scriptures on the topic of forgiveness, as well as the practical relational process involved in offering forgiveness to others and the hope of reconciliation."

Middle School, Worship at Redeemer: Youth Room
